

- Rep. Reschenthaler sent letter to USACE HQ
 - Signed by all other SWPA federal electeds
 - Asks for freeze in level of service while efforts to increase commercial traffic continue
- Sub-group working on economic impact study independent of USACE

45% of respondents cited the need for specialized software as a barrier to growing their business.










45% cite the use of data/web analytics as important to their business.


